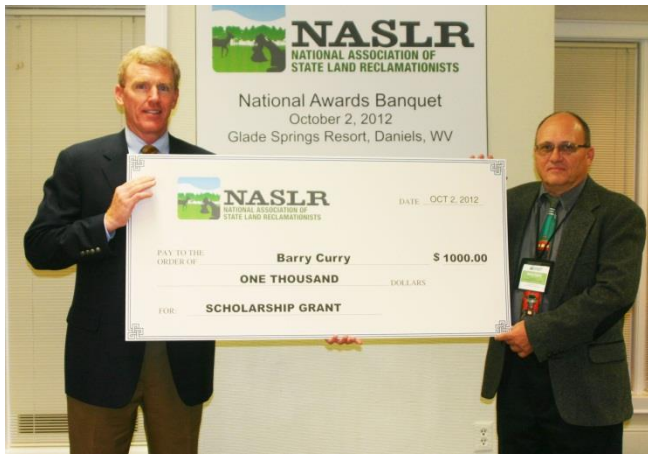

NOTES FROM THE FIELD

These two programs are usually the first two to be cut when budgets and staff availability becomes limited. After all, the positive impacts of education and public outreach are long term with little immediate impact. In addition, regardless of how much local outreach you do, there will always be the not so silent minority that will get the attention of the media and make themselves known at public meetings. Still, agencies need to get the word out to the affected public as to what they do, what

authority they have and equally as important what you don’t regulate.

Even though regulatory agencies do not promote the mineral they regulate, there is merit to informing the public in an education venue such as a state fair or conservation day, as to what minerals are used for. Most of the adult and young public, including many teachers, have little understanding what mined rocks and minerals are used for. For example, most people don’t know that plastics and most medicines are made from oil; limestone and carbonates are used in hundreds of products; rare earth minerals are critical to car emission controls and for the electric motors in hybrid cars, or that coal or coke is needed to make the steel in wind turbines.

The largest venues for public and education outreach are your web site, the state fair or a large public event in the mining regions. In our state we fill a 2400 square feet tent and have displays for every division as to who we are and what we do regarding environmental or safety protection. There are also mining models and posters about coal, non-coal minerals, oil and gas production, including a full size moving oil pump jack. Every year we feature a rock or mineral which is produced in the state and what it is used for. The two biggest draws area the Illinois Minerals in the Bathroom display and quiz. After completing the quiz, children are allowed to dig in a big sandbox and get to keep their favorite find of a rock or mineral. We get over 4000 kids to this 10 day event. The second biggest draw is the “Are you undermined” display, complete with the known boundaries of the underground mines on county maps. In addition, this always brings in a few leads on previously unknown mine maps. It is manned for 10 days/ 2 shifts per day, which is a huge demand on the headquarters staff. It is felt this outreach effort is worth the investment in our resources. Another venue that has been hugely successful in reaching the agricultural community is having a booth at the annual state Farm Bureau convention. The goal should never be that public outreach will eliminate controversy. No matter what, certain

interest groups will continue to propagandize to the public about how bad your agency is and provide misinformation about the public input process and the purpose of public hearings. By the way, OSM has an excellent program on public outreach method.
